OAKLAND CHRISTIAN CHURCH
The Beginning

In the January Oakland Newsletter, there was a reminder of an important year in the life of our church. 2022! This year we celebrate our 150th anniversary: 1872-2022. Let's start at the beginning of our story.

In December, 1871, Dr. William B. Wellons, organizer of several Christian Churches in the Suffolk/Nansemond County area, and trustees for the Christian Church now about to be organized as Oakland Church, purchased 2 acres of land here in the bend of the road outside the village of Chuckatuck. Under the leadership of Dr. Wellons, the church was organized early in 1872 with 30 charter members. Later that year, the church was welcomed into the Eastern Virginia Conference of Christian Churches in session at Hebron Church, near Carrsville, Virginia.

On this 2 acre site stood a small church, just 36 ft. x 40 ft., previously owned by the Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1871 they united with the Methodists Protestant Church (Wesley Chapel) in Chuckatuck and chose the Wesley Chapel site as their home church. This site was vacated. The original building was enlarged in 1893 when a vestibule was added to the front and 18 to 20 ft. were added to the rear, and again in 1962 when a central entrance, the narthex, and steeple were added. This is our present day Fellowship Hall! Stand in the middle of the room sometime, look around you, and just think of all the history that has been made here. It was where our forefathers worshiped from 1872 until 1925, and again in 2007 when the sanctuary was being refurbished and many of the stained glass windows were removed and trucked off to the western part of Virginia to be repaired; where opening exercises for Sunday School were held from the very beginning to just a few years ago; where quarterly conferences were held - after morning worship, in the afternoon or at night; where dinners were served - Memorial Day dinners, as well as pot luck suppers; where scouts, beekeepers, and church committees met; where Fall Fest and bazaars before it were held; where family reunions, and funeral receptions were held and wedding receptions took place.

This small building became our Fellowship Hall and has been the center of our church life for 150 years!

The season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, March 2nd, 2022. In many churches it is a time for preparation for joining the church, culminating on Easter Sunday with baptism and church vows. The church has a long tradition for preparing new members for their journey of Faith.

We are told in a new liturgy for baptism suggested by the United Church of Christ entitled “What Do You Seek?” that “in the ancient church, the forty days of Lent were a time of intense preparation for baptism and a time of renewal and penitence for the baptized. The season begins on Ash Wednesday when the community of faith is confronted with its absolute dependence on God who gives breath to each and to the whole community itself. Moving from that confrontation, the community is invited to journey with Christ through the lectionary readings of Lent, encountering the deeper meaning of baptism. Lent can be the time when we are deeply formed in the image of Christ. The season culminates on Easter when we share in Christ’s resurrection and baptism.”

Maybe it has been a long time since you have thought about your baptism. Or maybe you are thinking about being baptized and making a commitment to the church. Either way, the liturgy of baptism keeps before us the same question: “What do you seek?” Think again what it was you sought when you made your commitment to the church. And if you are going to join the church, truly search your heart for what is that is being sought by you and what will be expected of you.

In the liturgy when the one presented for baptism is asked the question “What do you seek?” the candidate says, “I seek to know Jesus Christ.” I encourage all of us to look at our baptism with prayer and meditation upon the phrase “I seek to know Jesus Christ” in the Lenten Season soon to come. The strength, testimony, and the Church’s role in the world begin and end with our baptism. All rest upon how seriously we take and commit ourselves to: “I seek to know Jesus Christ”.

At the end of the liturgy for baptism there is a blessing. I offer you that blessing now in prayer and confidence that this Lenten Season will put you on a focus journey and straight path of deeper commitment and love for Jesus Christ and His Holy church.

Receive the mark of the cross on your forehead.
As a sign of the way you are to go,
And as a sign of Christ with you in strength and love,
May the power of the Holy Spirit lead you to know
And to follow Jesus Christ. Amen.

Oakland's Legacy Program

Oakland's Legacy Program consists of two parts:

The first part, "Oakland's Legacy Members", is for those who have informed the Legacy Committee, or the church office that they plan to leave a gift to the church upon their death. With their permission, their names will be recorded on the Oakland's Legacy Members plaque.

The second part, "Oakland's Legacy Angels", is for those whose gifts to the church have been received after their death from their will or estate plan. Unless they wish to remain anonymous, their names will be permanently engraved on the Oakland's Legacy Angels plaque.

The Legacy Committee has purchased a leather journal where all Legacy Angels gifts, and how each was used to benefit our church, will be recorded and become a permanent part of Oakland's history.

These two plaques hang side by side in the Fellowship Hall just to the left of the entrance to the sanctuary.
