The program incentivizes the purchase of native trees and shrubs by providing a \$25 discount on eligible trees of \$50






Scholarship applications available now

Pastor Stump shares thoughts on Order of Naucratius retreat

Hello Church!

As you know, I recently gathered with folks from across the country for the fourth annual Order of Naucratius Retreat in Clinton. Louisiana.

This retreat is so very unique. In its current form it is run out of The Episcopal Church Diocese of Southern Ohio. There are chapters in Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Oklahoma, and Indiana.

Focusing on the values of Saint Naucratius, who gathered fish and wild game to feed the poor, this particular retreat gathers folks to harvest feral wild hogs in Louisiana and then properly process the meat so that it can be used as physical and spiritual nourishment.

The landowners in Louisiana are grateful for our help in trying to control the wild hog population, which causes erosion, damages agricultural resources, threatens livestock, and brings other detrimental side effects due to their ability to survive and reproduce at a rapid rate. Make no mistake, this is to harvest. Each of us who gather understands this. We take great care our church member Andy to harvest ethically and efficiently and to ensure that the animal's life can provide nourishment.

Each day, we held noonday prayer from the Episcopal Book of Worship, held a blessing before the daily hunt, and gave thanks in the field for each animal harvested.

On Sunday morning, we gathered for worship and Holy Eucharist outdoors on The Brady Farm, the



property of our very gracious hosts.

In between all of this, there were meals prepared and shared, campfire stories, laughter, deep sharing, and the many benefits of spending the bulk of the time under God's sky in all its colors. I even got to experience a severe Louisiana storm in the midst of a crawfish boil. Unexpectedly, I was able to meet the author of one of my favorite books, "The God of Wild Places" by Tony Jones. I now consider Tony a friend and look forward to being with him and many others again next year. In just two years, it has truly become a community of real value for me.

- Quarterly, put "Frequently Asked Questions" about Oakland's Legacy Angel program in our church newsletter.


